


Attendance




A reminder that children will return to school on **Monday 7th June** at the usual time.

Stranger incidents

In the local news and on social media recently I know that there have been several reports of children being approached by adults in neighbouring boroughs, which has caused some discussion between some of our parents/carers in relation to their child/ren's safety. Keyworth has a duty to safeguard children and I would like to reassure you all that schools would be contacted by the Southwark safeguarding team/the Police if we needed to share concerns with our families - we have not been. We have been advised that families should continue to remain vigilant but not necessarily any more vigilant than they would be at any other time. We have also been referred to the following statement:

Superintendent Andy Britain said: *"I understand the concern expressed on social media and would like to reassure people there is no cause for alarm. If we receive information that increases any risk to our children, I will ensure that our residents and schools are made aware immediately. I would urge the community not to speculate any further."*

This speculation gives an opportune moment for parents/carers to talk to their child/ren about staying safe when interacting with people they do not know. I shared this resource previously but to remind everyone that the '**Stranger Danger**' message has been updated as it was felt that it was outdated and delivered a confusing message to distrust all strangers.
